SENTENCES

EXAMPLES:

- a. He was a fast runner, fast because he needed to be.
- b. He was a <u>smart</u> dresser, <u>smart</u> because he had the money to buy the best.
- c. It was a <u>foolish</u> animal, <u>foolish</u> in a way that will become obvious as this story unfolds.
- d. It was a silent town, silent in a way that did not make you feel restful.

EXPLANATION:

An Ad, same ad sentence contains two identical adjectives, one repeated shortly after the other.

The first is used in the opening clause of a sentence and the second is used immediately after the comma which ends that clause. This sentence form includes repetition as a way of emphasising an adjective. When used with skill, the repeated word or phrase resonates in the reader's mind.

TEACHING TIPS:

When introducing Ad, same ad sentences I always begin by asking pupils to suggest adjectives for a simple sentence in which the adjective has been deliberately omitted.

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He was	s a	man
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I then model how to turn the pupils' answers into an *Ad, same ad* sentence in the following manner:

1. Add an adjective:

He was a cruel man.

2. Turn the full-stop into a comma:

He was a cruel man,

3. Repeat the adjective after the comma:

He was a cruel man, cruel

4. Add the word because after the repeated adjective:

He was a cruel man, cruel because

5. Complete the sentence:

He was a cruel man, cruel, because he always hit his dog.

When pupils have grasped this I model other *Ad, same ad* sentences which use words other than *because* as the bridge to the latter half of the sentence. (Note that examples c and d have used *in a way* as a bridging phrase).
