# **SENTENCES**

# **EXAMPLES:**

- a. The moon hung above us <u>like a patient</u>, pale white face.
- b. Although it was August it was as cold as a late December evening.

### **EXPLANATION:**

A *simile sentence* has, quite obviously, a central simile which creates a vivid picture in the reader's mind.

With younger pupils, I call these ... like a ... and ... as a ... sentences as this provides the writer with the language of comparison necessary when creating similes.

# **TEACHING TIPS:**

The key to producing an effective *simile sentence* is to avoid cliché. One way of achieving this is to start by producing a poster of *Banned Similes* such as;

#### **BANNED**

It was as cold as ice.

It was as hot as the sun.

He shivered like a leaf.

I then show children a method of making such banned similes more interesting by adding 'Where?' and 'When?' to the end of the cliché, for example

## BANNED

It was as cold as ice.

becomes

### **BETTER**

It was as cold as ice floating in the Arctic ocean on a moonlit winter night.

WHERE?

(Think of a very cold place)

WHEN?

(Think of a time when it is very

cold)
